Overview of the Public Meeting

This report provides a summary of the events that took place at Public Meeting #1 for the North Kent Wind 1 Project (the Project) held on July 8, 2015. The public meeting was held at the Country View Golf Course, 25393 St. Clair Road, Dover Centre, Ontario from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. The public meeting was hosted by North Kent Wind 1 LP, by its general partner, North Kent Wind 1 GP Inc. (North Kent Wind 1). North Kent Wind 1 is a joint venture limited partnership owned by affiliates of Pattern Renewable Holdings Canada ULC (Pattern Development) and Samsung Renewable Energy Inc. (Samsung Renewable Energy).

The public meeting was held to introduce the Project, provide an overview of the Renewable Energy Approval (REA) process, respond to questions from the community about the Project and obtain community input for consideration in the planning and design of the Project. The public meeting was organized as an information session. Information panels (**Appendix A**) were grouped by topic and displayed around the venue along with maps of the Project Study Area, copies of the Draft Project Description Report and Project Factsheets that were also available for review. Members of the Project team were present to discuss Project information and answer questions.

As members of the public arrived they were asked to sign in and were given a comment sheet (**Appendix B**) to provide feedback. Members of the public were given the option of filling out the forms on-site or providing their comments to the Project team via mail or e-mail following the meeting. It is estimated that approximately 150 individuals attended the meeting, of which 127 signed in. Following the meeting, the information panels were made available to the public on the Project website at www.northkentwind.com.

On June 2, 2015, Aboriginal communities, local municipalities and government agencies were sent a letter and notice of the public meeting date and location (**Appendix C**). The notice was also mailed to



approximately 3,720 land owners, residents and businesses within 550 metres (m) of the Project Study Area on June 2, 2015. On June 3, 2015 the notice was also posted on the Project website at www.northkentwind.com.

Comments Received

A total of ten comment sheets were received at the public meeting and one additional comment sheet was received via email following the public meeting. A summary of written questions/comments received and responses are included in **Table 1** below. Verbal comments received at the public meeting were addressed during the meeting and noted in the table below. Copies of the comment sheets received, with personal information removed, are included in **Appendix D**.



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Planning and Early Design Stage

Design of the North Kent Wind 1 Project

- » We are in the planning and early design stages and a Draft Project Description Report has been prepared
- » The North Kent Wind 1 Project is expected to produce a total nameplate capacity of up to 100 MW of electricity
- » The turbine number, model and height will depend on various factors including: wind resource, siting restrictions, and socio-economic or natural environment constraints
- » The major components of the North Kent Wind 1 Project are anticipated to include:
 - Wind turbine generators and foundations
 - Pad-mounted step-up transformers
 - Turbine access roads
 - Buried and overhead electrical collector system and ancillary facilities
 - Collector substation
 - Microwave tower
 - Meteorological towers
 - Interconnection station
 - Operations and maintenance building
 - Temporary construction staging areas







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How Wind Works

Harnessing the Wind


- » Wind turbines capture kinetic energy in surface winds and convert it into electrical energy using large blades mounted on tall towers
- » As wind moves over turbine blades, it causes "lift" – the same effect used by airplane wings
- » Lift makes the blade rotate, which turns the shaft
- » The turning shaft creates electricity within a generator, which in turn creates electricity that can be sent to the power grid

Main Components

- » Blades which convert the wind's energy into rotational shaft energy
- » A nacelle (enclosure) containing a drive train, usually including a gearbox and generator
- » A tower to support the rotor and drive train
- » Electronic equipment such as controls, electrical cables, ground support and equipment
- » Transformer which converts the electricity to a common voltage

Ancillary Components

- » Operations and maintenance building to monitor day-to-day operations
- » Collector system to carry electricity from the turbines to the collector substation
- » Collector substation to collect the electrical collector lines and transform the collector line voltage (34.5 kV) to a transmission voltage (230 kV)

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Renewable Energy Approval Process

REA Process

The REA is issued under Ontario Regulation 359/09 (Renewable Energy Approvals under Part V.0.1 of the Act) under the *Environmental Protection Act.*

The REA application will outline how North Kent Wind 1 proposes to design, build, operate and decommission the Project.

Additional environmental approval and permitting requirements from agencies such as the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry, Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport, the St. Clair Region Conservation Authority, and the Lower Thames Valley Conservation Authority will be addressed as part of and subsequent to the North Kent Wind 1 Project REA application.

Municipal permits and plans (e.g., Building Permit, Entrance Permit) will also be required from the Municipality of Chatham-Kent prior to construction.

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
Turbine Siting Process

Steps for Developing a Site Plan


- Identify a sufficient wind resource and study the wind conditions for several consecutive years
- 2. Work with local landowners to option land for wind turbines and supporting Project infrastructure (i.e., collector lines and access roads)
- 3. Identify technical and environmental constraints based on input from Project engineers, ecologists and aquatic biologists, heritage experts, local landowners, First Nation and other Aboriginal communities as well as government agencies
- 4. Identify locations to site Project infrastructure within the remaining land available (see figures to the right) while adhering to the setback distances prescribed by the province (i.e., Ontario Regulation 359/09)
 - Project components can be sited within the setbacks for some terrestrial features provided that an Environmental Impact Study is completed and mitigation measures are identified





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Wind Turbine Setback Requirements

Project Related Infrastructure

Under the REA process, the Ministry of the Environment and Climate Change has established required setback distances from receptors for all renewable energy facilities.

If Project related infrastructure (turbines, access roads, collector system, etc.) is located within the setback distances, additional analysis (i.e., Environmental Impact Study) will be provided in the REA application and summarized in the final Project Description Report.

A preliminary list of environmental components being considered includes:

- » Terrestrial and Aquatic Environment (Natural Heritage and Waterbodies)
- » Surface Water and Groundwater
- » Topography, Geology and Soils
- » Sound
- » Air Quality
- » Current Use of Land and Resources

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Natural Heritage

The Project Study Area is dominated by annual row crops and has limited natural habitats such as woodlands and meadows.

During field monitoring, biologists will examine all habitat within a minimum of 120 metres of the proposed Project to identify:

- Woodlands
- Wetlands
- Significant Wildlife Habitat

Wildlife habitat assessments were initiated in the spring of 2015 and are being undertaken to determine the extent of potentially significant wildlife habitats within the Project Study Area.

Site-specific wildlife surveys will be conducted prior to Project development to assess the temporal and spatial use of the Project Study Area by individual species and verify any potential effects that the Project may have on these species and their habitat.





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Water Bodies and Groundwater

The water resources within the Project Study Area include agricultural drains, permanent, intermittent and ephemeral streams, and rivers. These water resources may provide suitable habitat for fish and mussel species.

As part of the field work, all water features within a minimum of 120 metres of the Project will be examined by aquatic biologists. This investigation will review general site conditions as well as representative watercourses including permanent and intermittent water features.

A hydrogeological assessment will be conducted to ensure there will be no effects on groundwater quality, quantity or movement resulting from construction or operations of the Project.





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Archaeology and Cultural Heritage

Archaeological and heritage assessments are being conducted to evaluate the potential for archaeological and cultural resources in the Project Study Area.

The Stage 1 Archaeological Assessment consisted of an initial desktop review to to gather information about the Project Study Area's geography, history, current land conditions and any previous archaeological research within the vicinity. This assessment was completed in the spring of 2015.

The Stage 2 Archaeological Assessment is being conducted during the summer of 2015. It consists of archaeologists completing pedestrian surveys, i.e., walking through ploughed fields at intervals to document any artifacts encountered.

Further assessments will be undertaken, as required, to identify mitigation measures if archaeological or cultural heritage resources are present.





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Sound, Land Use and Infrastructure

Sound

Turbines will be placed at least 550 metres from the closest sound receptor and sound levels will be at or below 40 decibels (dBA) at 6 metres per second as required by the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change noise guidelines for wind energy centres


Land Use and Infrastructure

Land uses in the Project Study Area is predominantly designated and zoned for agricultural use but also includes non-farm residential uses, surplus farm dwelling lots, older estate lots, general industrial and rural industrial zones.

Local services and infrastructure will be identified through consultation with the Municipality of Chatham-Kent and the Ministry of Transportation.

Active and non-active petroleum wells and natural gas pipelines are present in the Project Study Area. An assessment of petroleum resources will be conducted to determine the effects of the Project on these resources.



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

STRATFORD - More than 100 cattle were moved from a barn northeast of here before it was destroyed by fire.

Dense smoke billowing from the blaze on Road 108 was visible more than 10 kilometres away in Stratford on Friday afternoon.

Damage to the large ,two-storey steel barn at Skylane Holsteins farm will exceed \$500,000, Perth East and West Fire Chief Bill Hunter said from the scene.

Owners of the farm were able to move to safety all 110 cows and another 25 calves, he said. One cow died outside.

Firefighters from Perth East stations in Shakespeare, Sebringville and Milverton, along with mutual aid provided by firefighters and two tankers from Wellesley, battled the blaze throughout the afternoon

The main barn was fully engulfed in flames when the first Shakespeare truck arrived shortly after the 911 call was received at 10:53 a.m., Hunter said.

Firefighters focused on saving two nearby structures: a drive oif the rails when he lost steady shed to the west of the main building and a smaller barn to the south with 70 cattle in it.

"Those were the two buildings we concentrated on protecting, and we were successful," Hunter said. "They're both still standing."

The cattle in the smaller barn were able to stay safe inside as firefighters almed a steady stream of water on the structure to pro-

Surveying the scene as a large excavator moved structural steel from the site in the late afternoon, Hunter said It will be difficult to determine a cause of the blaze. It is not in any way considered suspicious, he noted.



Overview of the Public Meeting

This report provides a summary of the events that took place at Public Meeting #2 for the North Kent Wind 1 Project (the Project) held on November 5, 2015. The public meeting was held at the Country View Golf Course, 25393 St. Clair Road, Dover Centre, Ontario from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. The public meeting was hosted by North Kent Wind 1 LP, by its general partner, North Kent Wind 1 GP Inc. (North Kent Wind 1). North Kent Wind 1 is a joint venture limited partnership owned by affiliates of Pattern Renewable Holdings Canada ULC (Pattern Development) and Samsung Renewable Energy Inc. (Samsung Renewable Energy).

The purpose of the public meeting was to present the proposed Project layout, review the results of technical studies undertaken to date (including descriptions of potential effects on the environment and associated mitigation measures), provide an update on the anticipated timeline for the Renewable Energy Approval (REA) process and obtain feedback about the Project from the community.

The public meeting was organized as an information session. Information panels (**Appendix A**) were grouped by topic and displayed around the venue for review. In addition, a factsheet (**Appendix A**), maps of the Project Study Area and simulated sound isocontour levels, and copies of the Draft REA Reports were also available for review. Members of the Project team were present to discuss Project information and answer questions.

As members of the public arrived they were asked to sign-in and were given a comment form (**Appendix B**) to provide feedback. Members of the public were given the option of filling out the forms on-site or providing their comments to the Project team via mail or e-mail following the meeting. Registration records indicate that 46 individuals opted to sign-in. Following the meeting, the information panels were made available to the public on the Project website at www.northkentwind.com.

On September 1, 2015, First Nation and Aboriginal Communities, local municipalities and relevant federal and provincial government agencies were sent a letter and notice of the public meeting date and location (**Appendix C**). The notice was also mailed to approximately 3,720 land owners, residents and businesses within 550 metres (m) of the Project Study Area on August 31, 2015. On August 31, 2015 the notice was also posted on the Project website at www.northkentwind.com.

Comments Received

A total of six comment forms were received at the public meeting, three of which were provided by one individual. Six additional comment forms were received via email following the public meeting and comments were received verbally from one individual. A summary of written questions / comments received and responses are included in **Table 1** below. Verbal comments received at the public meeting were addressed during the meeting and noted in the table below. Copies of the comment forms received, with personal information removed, are included in **Appendix D**.

Determining where a wind turbine can be located is a complex process. There are many environmental considerations that influence the location of a potential wind turbine, including archeology, cultural heritage, aquatic and terrestrial ecology, groundwater, sound and setbacks from existing infrastructure (e.g., roads and railways). During the turbine siting process, environmental constraints are identified and reviewed based on input from technical experts and government agencies. The ultimate location of wind turbines needs to meet the standard as set by the provincial government under the <i>Environmental Protection Act</i> in O. Reg. 359/09, as amended. The Project layout will be designed to meet the regulatory requirements for renewable energy projects outlined by the MOECC. The minimum setback requirement from non-participating receptors (e.g., residential homes, schools, and other uses sensitive to noise) is 550 m. Sound levels from turbines must also be at or below 40 decibels (dBA) at 6 metres per second (m/sec) at all non-participating receptors. This standard is set by the provincial government under the <i>Environmental Protection Act</i> in O. Reg. 359/09, as amended. North Kent Wind 1 is working with the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) to identify the potential for the Project to impact any Species at Risk, including associated mitigation measures to avoid any impacts, where possible.





The REA is issued under Ontario Regulation 359/09 (Renewable Energy Approvals under Part V.0.1 of the Act) under the Environmental Protection Act.

The REA application will outline how North Kent Wind 1 proposes to design, build, operate and decommission the Project.

The Project is considered to be a Class 4 wind facility which means it has a nameplate capacity of 50 kilowatts or greater and is not in direct contact with surface water, other than a wetland.

A Consultation Report documenting all consultation and engagement activities will be prepared and submitted with the REA application.

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

Steps for Developing a Site Plan


- 1. Identify a sufficient wind resource and study the wind regime for several consecutive years.
- 2. Work with local landowners to option land for wind turbines and supporting Project infrastructure (i.e., collection lines and access roads).
- 3. Identify technical and environmental constraints based on input from Project engineers, ecologists and aquatic biologists, cultural experts, local landowners, First Nation and other Aboriginal groups as well as government agencies.
- 4. Identify locations to site Project infrastructure by balancing these technical and environmental constraints while adhering to the setback distances prescribed by the province (i.e., Ontario Regulation 359/09).
 - Project components can be sited within the setbacks for some terrestrial features provided that an Environmental Impact Study is completed and mitigation measures are identified.





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How Wind Works

Harnessing the Wind


- » Wind turbines capture kinetic energy in surface winds and convert it into electrical energy using aerodynamic blades mounted on towers
- » As wind moves over turbine blades, it causes "lift" – the same effect used by airplane wings
- » Lift makes the blade rotate, which turns the shaft
- » The turning shaft creates electricity within a generator, which in turn creates electricity that can be sent to the power grid

Main Components

- » Blades which convert the wind's energy into rotational shaft energy
- A nacelle (enclosure) containing a drive train, usually including a gearbox and generator
- » A tower to support the rotor and drive train
- » Electronic equipment such as controls, electrical cables, ground support and equipment
- » Transformer which converts the electricity to a common voltage

Ancillary Components

- » Operations and maintenance building to monitor day-to-day operations
- » Collector system to carry electricity from the turbines to the collector substation
- Collector substation to collect the electrical collector lines and transform the collector line voltage (34.5 kV) to a transmission voltage (230 kV)

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Providing Clean and Safe Power

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Wind Turbine Specifications

The Project will use the Siemens SWT-3.2-113 wind turbine.

The Siemens SWT-3.2-113 wind turbine has a nominal power rating of approximately 2.3 to 3.2 MW.


Each turbine tower is anticipated to have an underground concrete foundation up to 25 metres wide and 2.5 metres deep.

A spread-foot type foundation will be constructed, except where geotechnical conditions require the use of a pile type foundation.

The turbine has a hub height of 99.5 metres and rotor diameter of 113 metres.

The 'cut-in wind speed,' or when the wind turbines begin to spin, is 3 to 5 metres per second.

The 'cut-out wind speed,' or when the wind turbines automatically stop spinning, is 32 metres per second.









Construction Activities

Overview of Construction Activities

Site Preparation

- » Staking and surveying, clearing and grubbing
- » Preparation of construction staging areas

Construction of Facility

- » Construction of access roads (8 to 15 metres with shoulder during construction)
- » Installation of foundations for turbines (25 metre diameter)
- » Base preparation for substation (approximately 10 acres)
- » Wind turbine, substation and interconnection station installation
- » Construction of operations and maintenance building (approximately 7 acres)
- » Installation of collector lines
- » Testing and commissioning

Site Restoration

- » Removal and disposal of all construction materials and temporary facilities
- » Backfilling of topsoil, where appropriate, to achieve proper drainage
- » Re-vegetation as needed

Traffic and Roads

- » North Kent Wind 1 will work closely with the Municipality of Chatham-Kent to develop a traffic management plan. The plan will ensure:
 - Only designated transportation routes will be followed
 - Proper signage for detours will be prominently displayed
 - Traffic controllers and police escorts will be used as necessary

Potential Effects and Mitigation Measures

The potential effects during the construction phase will mainly be related to dust, noise and traffic congestion.

- » Dust will be mitigated by using best management practices including dust suppressants, implementing speed limits and revegetating cleared areas as soon as possible
- » Noise will be mitigated by keeping all equipment in good repair and not exceeding noise limits specified by the Ministry of the Environment and Climate Change
- » Traffic congestion will be mitigated by developing a traffic management plan in coordination with the Municipality of Chatham-Kent







Operations and Maintenance

Overview of Operations and Maintenance Activities

- » Real-time monitoring of the Project will occur locally and remotely to maintain the performance and safety of the wind turbines
- » Performance and reliability will be maintained through a state-ofthe-art Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition system
- » Routine and unplanned maintenance of Project components will be undertaken
- » An Emergency Response and Communication Plan is outlined in the Draft Design and Operations Report
- » The anticipated lifespan of the Project (commercial operation) is 20 years

Potential Effects and Mitigation Measures

- » Post-construction monitoring of potential environmental impacts will be completed for at least three (3) years at this facility
- » The potential effects during the operation phase will mainly be related to wildlife and noise
 - Wildlife effects will be mitigated through lighting that is least likely to attract birds and/or bats
 - Noise will be mitigated by following Ontario regulations for minimum setbacks and turbines will be monitored remotely or from an operation centre







Decommissioning Activities

It is anticipated that the Project will have a commercial operational life of 20 years, which can be extended further with proper maintenance, component replacement and repowering.

At the end of the Project's operational life, all components will be shut down and isolated from external electrical lines.

North Kent Wind 1 is responsible for all aspects of the decommissioning of the Project including the associated costs.

Overview of Decommissioning Activities:

- » Removal of the wind turbines for re-use or disposal
- » Removal of foundations (to depth of approximately 1 metre) and any access roads, to a depth suitable for ploughing, except where the road is assumed for farming use
- » Replacement of subsoil and topsoil to match adjacent undisturbed land
- » Former agricultural lands will be restored to allow agricultural activities to continue
- » All activities will be carried out to minimize environmental impacts through the use of best management practices

Potential effects and mitigation measures during decommissioning are expected to be similar to those during construction.







Archaeological Assessments

A Stage 1 archaeological background study was conducted to determine the archaeological potential of the North Kent Wind 1 Project Study Area. Following the recommendation determined from background research, a Stage 2 archaeological assessment was also completed.

During Stage 2 field work, over 3,300 acres of land was assessed.

The Stage 2 archaeological assessment identified 58 locations with cultural material. Ten (10) of the 58 archaeological locations exhibited cultural heritage value or interest.

Only one (1) location with cultural heritage value or interest is within the footprint of the Project.

Mitigation Measures:

- » The ten (10) locations that exhibited cultural heritage value or interest were recommended for a Stage 3 site-specific archaeological assessment
- » Nine (9) sites will be protected and avoided during construction and the one (1) site within the footprint of the Project will have a Stage 3 site-specific archaeological assessment conducted. A Stage 4 archaeological assessment will be undertaken, if required
- » The nine (9) sites not impacted by the Project Location will be surrounded by a 20 metre protective buffer where no ground alteration activities will take place
- » Where required, a licensed archaeologist will monitor construction activities

By using these mitigation measures, no significant negative effects to archaeological resources are expected.









Heritage Impact Assessment

The majority of the land within the Project Study Area is used for agricultural purposes.

Cultural heritage landscapes are geographical areas that may have been modified by human activity and are identified as having cultural heritage value or interest by a community, including an Aboriginal community.

Through a windshield survey, 14 potential built heritage resources (11 residences and three (3) barns) and six (6) potential cultural heritage landscapes 40 years of age or older were documented. Of these, eight (8) were identified to have potential cultural heritage value or interest. Six (6) cultural heritage landscapes were also evaluated, with only one (1) identified as containing cultural heritage value or interest. None of the eight (8) resources are designated as protected.

Only one (1) property was identified as potentially experiencing indirect impacts as a result of the Project. Retaining the existing vegetative screening would sufficiently mitigate negative indirect impacts from the Project.

No further direct or indirect negative effects are anticipated as a result of the Project, therefore no further mitigation is recommended.





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Natural Heritage Assessment

A review of available background resources was completed to identify any potentially significant natural features such as woodlands, wetlands and Significant Wildlife Habitat within 120 metres of the Project Location.

Site investigations were conducted and included planning and undertaking field work, compiling records and reporting results.

The significance of each natural feature within 120 metres of the Project Location was evaluated using Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry accepted standards, guidelines and literature.

Significant natural features included:

- » Five (5) wetlands
- » 89 wildlife habitats
- » 13 woodlands

Based on the implementation of the planned mitigation measures, monitoring programs and contingency plans (if necessary), it is unlikely that there will be any significant impacts to natural heritage features.

Monitoring of potential post-construction environmental impacts will be completed for at least three (3) years at this facility.



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Potential Effects on Natural Heritage Features and Mitigation

The table below presents a summary of the potential effects on natural heritage features and some of the associated mitigation measures.

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Water Bodies Assessment

An assessment of the water bodies (i.e., lakes, seepage areas and intermittent / permanent watercourses) within 120 metres of the Project Location and lake trout lakes within 300 metres of the Project Location was conducted to identify potential impacts to water bodies located within the Project Study Area.

62 water bodies were identified within the Project Study Area, all of which represent intermittent or permanent drainage features.

53 of these water bodies cross the Project Location, totalling 127 individual crossing locations.

If mitigation measures are followed, no significant impacts to water bodies are anticipated.











Potential Effects on Water Bodies and Mitigation

The table below presents a summary of the potential effects on water bodies and some of the associated mitigation measures.

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Noise Impact Assessment

A noise impact assessment was completed to identify noise levels at receptors within 1,500 metres of the wind turbines or the collector substation.


The assessment was comprised of the following steps:

- » Step 1
 - Identify points of reception dwellings (typically houses) that are within 1,500 metres of wind turbines or the collector substation
- » Step 2
 - Obtain wind turbine specifications and noise emission ratings from the manufacturer
- » Step 3
 - Incorporate the turbine and substation locations and sound power levels into a noise model to predict overall noise levels at each point of reception
- » Step 4
 - Adjust turbine locations during modelling to minimize noise levels at identified receptors

There are 810 receptors located within 1,500 metres of a wind turbine or the substation that were assessed, 299 of which are vacant lots (i.e., property with no buildings or structures).

The results of the Noise Impact Assessment show that the Project complies with the Provincial Noise Guidelines.

Decibels (dBA) Of Common Sounds



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



EAT: Tart makes tasty late-summer supper

Ode to the juicy tomato

SARA MOULTON Associated Press

If you're like me, you believe a fresh, ripe tomato is one of the best things about summer. This tart is an ode to the tomato in season — and a lesson about how to make the most of it. Let's start with how to choose the best

tomatoes. First, smell the stem and con-firm it smells strongly like a tomato. Next, figure out if it's juicy by hefting it. You want a heavy tomato.

If you buy more tomatoes than you can eat right away, store the extras on a coun-ter away from the sunlight. Do not put them on a sunny window-sill, which can make them rot.

Likewise, don't put them in the refrig-rator. which can kill their flavour if they're not already ripe and make them mealy after a few days.

If you bought a few tomatoes that weren't quite ripe and you want to speed up the process, put them in a brown paper bag with a banana. One of the main reasons we love toma-

toes in season is because they're so juicy. That's great when we eat them raw, not so great when we're making a tomato pie. How to keep juicy tomatoes from turning that pie into a watery mess? By slicing and salting them ahead of time. The salt drains the tomato of its excess liquid and concentrates its natural flavours. Though tomatoes are terrific all by

themselves, they also get along famously with virtually every herb under the sun and just about any cheese you care to

name. This recipe calls for Gruyere, but feel free to experiment with different herbs and cheeses that melt. Make this recipe your own.



SUMMER'S END TOMATO TART

Start to finish: 2 hours 55 minutes (30 minutes active) Servings: 8

All-purpose flour, for rolling out the dough I pie dough (recipe below) or 12 oz (340 g) store-bought pie dough

Start to finish: 1 hour 15 minutes (15 minutes active) Makes 1 batch pie dough

25 minutes. Carefully remove weights and foil. Return shell to oven and bake until light golden, about another 8 minutes. Transfer tart shell to a rack and let cool 15 minutes.

While tart shell is baking, slice tomatoes 1/3 inch (8 mm) thick, sprinkle liberally with salt, then arrange on a wire rack to drain over sink or a rimmed baking sheet.

Gently squeeze a small handful of the dough. It should hold together without crumbling apart. If it doesn't, add more ice water, ½ tbsp.(75 mL) at a time, string 2 or 3 times after each addition until it comes together. Be careful: If you overwork the mixture or add too much water, the pastry will be tough.

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

Allegations of excessive use of force investigation

Chatham This Week

CK police are currently investigating allegations of excessive use of force by two of its members.

The matter came to the attention of police late last week and as a result, a chief's complaint was initiated and an investigator has been assigned to the file.

Police said they are currently in the preliminary stages of this investigation and are not releasing any further details at this time in order to avoid jeopardizing the investigation.

In a news release, Insp. Trevor Crane said these matters are taken very seriously and police will be conducting a full and thorough investigation into these allegations. According to a Postmedia Network report, a family has called on the Crown attorney's office to investigate after a home video security system captured what they allege is their teen son being the victim of excessive use of force by police.

The video, date stamped July 25, 2015, involves a 17-year-old Chatham male and some members of the Chatham - Kent Police Service.

The grainy video, which begins just after 2:30 a.m. and lasts for three-and-ahalf minutes, shows a vehicle pulling up in front of a house and a male getting out of the front passenger seat.

Flashing lights can be seen on the video as the male stands there.

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A police officer appears to approach and everyone in the video goes out of the view of the camera at the 35-second point.

What happens between police and the youth is not seen on the video until the 1:42 mark when the male appears to be thrown or pushed back into view of the camera, landing on the ground. He lies there for about five seconds before an officer comes into view and stands beside him. The male is on his hands and knees facing away from the officer, when the officer delivers five punches to the youth's head and another to his side.

While the youth is still on his hands and knees, another officer arrives and takes out what appears to be a Taser and places it on the shoulder blade of the male and discharges the device for several seconds before the teen is subdued and taken away by police.

Along with the video, the family took several photographs of the youth who had bruising and abrasions on his body from the altercation. He did not require medical treatment for his injuries. The teen, who cannot be

identified under the Criminal Youth Justice Act, is currently facing charges of assaulting a police officer and resisting arrest.

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

District Five By-Election acclamation expected, one nominee

Six Nations has a new councillor-elect for District 5 but she is a familiar face.

Former Six Nations Band Council Human Resources Director Hazel Johnson was the only contender for the District Five By-Election Saturday.

With nominations now closed, she is expected to be acclaimed as the new councillor for that district at the elected scheduled for September 26, says Dorothy Russell-Patterson, Chief Electorial Officer.

Johnson was the only person nominated at an open nomination session held at Emily C. General School on Saturday.

Johnson also has to accept and return her nomination form within 10 business days of being nominated, said Chief Electoral Officer Dorothy Patterson-Russell. Johnson is the former director of the Six Nations Band Council Human Resources Department.

She worked for the humand resources department for about 30 years says her brother and former Six Nations Elected Chief Bill Montour.

"I think she will make a good councillor. She has a good head on her shoulders and 20 to 30 years experience as a human resources director. So she knows council protocol."

He said in her role as human resources director "she use to keep council's feet to the fire on protocol and she would tell themwhen they were doing something they shouldn't."

He said "I think she is well positioned to be a district councillor and she has a a good heart and cares about the district and the community."

Nominations were declared open at 10 a.m. Saturday and ended at noon with no other contenders.

Johnson was nominated by her sister and daughter.

"Despite only having one candidate, one nominee, we still have to follow due process and hold our election day which we'll do on Sept. 26," said Russell-Patterson. The former elected chief said he was surprised by the election officer's call.

"When I was acclaimed in the 80s i was told I w as chief there was no election."

Johnson has launched a civil suit against council for an estimated \$250,000 after council restructured and her position became a manager's position instead of director. She retired and launched the suit that is still making its way through the courts.

Two councillors have expressed concern over Johnson's win when she is sueing council.

Montour said process was followed. "a public announcement went out, " she won, due process was held, council can be concerned all they want there is nothing in the code that says she is denied."

In fact Johnson would not be the only sitting council member involved in a lawsuit with council.

Elected chief Ava Hill sued council some five years ago when she was replaced as assistant to the elected chief by former elected chief Roberta Jamieson.

Johnson ran in District Five during the general election in November 2013 but lost out to Darryl Hill and Bob Johnson.

Six Nations Band Council called the by-election after Daryll Hill resigned to head A6N, a joint-venture firm between elected council and contracting firm Aecon. Council accepted Hill's resig-

nation on July 31.

The by-election will be held Sept. 26 at Emily C. General school from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. The eligibility requirements for all candidates are as follows:

-Must be a registered band member of Six Nations of the Grand River, and 18 years of age or older.

-Must be a permanent resident of Six Nations of the Grand River and/or have resided on the reserve for a minimum of one year prior to the by-election.

-Must live in the district they intend to run in. -Must provide a recent

-Must provide a recent (within the last four weeks) police check at the cost of the candidate.

A6N, the company Hill now heads, is located on Fourth Line Road and just formed this past spring.

The partnership firm per-

forms various contracting services, including clearing right-of-ways, completing restoration contracts, general utility work, directional drilling, and telecommunications and pipeline construction services. The firm also incorporates

green energy principles in its contract work through environmental plans that cover a broad range of issues, including stream flow and protection, protection of aquatic life and habitat, minimizing impacts to terrestrial spaces, scheduling work around migration and nesting, and ground and surface water management. The venture is Six Nationsmajority owned, at 51 per cent Six Nations and 49 per cent Aecon.

Lands and Membership Director Janice Burning will only be able to declare Johnson acclaimed after polls open for the by-election on Sept. 26, said Patterson-Russell. Johnson could not be reached for comment.

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

The book tells of a different time when outdoor and makeshift facilities were the norm and females weren't allowed to play.



"I don't live in the past," he said. "I still coach tennis in the summer and my rule is the same as it's always been - if you're not five minutes early, you're late. The kids understand that and respect it."

He said contrary to what's seen in many professional athletics, amateur sports still list as important the qualities of sportsmanship, honesty and even compassion.

"If I see the best tennis player going up against the worst, I know that the more talented player won't be out to humiliate his opponent," he said.



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Glossary of Terms

- 3. Average Value: The average value (%) of the chosen Statistics Canada demographic variables that can be associated with the letter carrier's route, which provides you with insight into your recipients.
- 4. Cumulative Penetration: The cumulative percentage of penetration associated with the letter carrier's routes based on the selected demographic variables.
- 5. Cumulative Points of Call: The cumulative point of call count associated with the letter carrier's routes, which has been calculated by adding the previous Delivery Mode rows in the report.
- 6. Delivery Mode: The area served by a letter carrier.

Comments:

Firstly, thank you for taking the time to explain the project and outline the many benefits associated with wind turbines. These details help everyone better understand the approach you are taking as well as outlining what to expect.

I understand not all potential locations will actually receive a turbine and I would like to suggest turbine 9 be considered as one of those locations to not receive a turbine. I feel the location presents additional risk that could be avoided.

This location presents additional environmental risks associated with crossing Big Creek. As I'm sure you are aware Big Creek is a habitat for many creatures including snapping turtles, fox snakes, seasonal ducks, geese and several species of fish. I'm sure you will take all the necessary precautions to avoid any impact to this environment but my concerns remains that this location presents additional risk.

This area also has a number of residential dwellings in close proximity to the turbine. Again I'm confident you have taken into account the required setbacks to minimize any impact to these locations.

I would not be fully honest if I didn't express some NIMBY feelings with this specific project. When my family decided to build our retirement home at this location the appeal of the clear rural agriculture landscape and bush in the back yard made the location and easy decision. This scenic view will now have an industrial turbine added directly in the centre, not what I was expecting to watch during my retirement years.

I understand there are many conflicting views on the health impacts of the turbines and have mixed feelings as to what is really happening. There appears to be a large number of proponents on both sides of the argument which makes me feel there is obviously something there.

Reducing the variables of wildlife impacts and human impacts by not installing turbine 9 can help to ensure your overall project is successful today and well into the future.

I wish you well with the project and recognize we all need to adjust to this change to help support our environmental journey.

At the outset, we would like to state our opposition to the North Kent Wind 1 project. Even though the project has received support/endorsement from Chatham-Kent council many residents in Chatham Township, as well as, within the greater municipality have grown tired of the overwhelming number of wind turbines across Chatham-Kent. In our view, it is excessive. We had hoped there would remain at least one township, within the municipality that would be unblemished by the presence of wind turbines.

We have concerns specifically about the location of 2 specific wind turbines, no. 9 and 37 (according to the map on the North Kent project website). Turbine no. 2 is east or our property and turbine no 37 is west of our property. We are concerned about the strobing effect when the sun is rising, east (or behind) of turbine no. 9 and when the sun is setting, west (or behind) of turbine no. 37. Both turbines we believe will cause a strobing effect on our property in the morning/evenings at certain times of the year (dependant on the earth's position relative to the sun).

We are also greatly concerned about the noise, even though it should be a bit less than 40 dcbl., We are not convinced the noise level will be inconsequential. As a family we spend a lot of time outside, our concern is that sound of the windmills will prove to be an annoyance and irritant – lead us to spend less time outdoors because of the sound of the turbines. In the spring/summer/fall months, we often have our windows open to enjoy the breeze and fresh air in the house. With the presence of these turbines, based on their current location, we will

hear the repetitive "swooshing" sound of the rotating blades. We will not want to hear this noise in the house, and as a result we'll likely choose to keep our windows closed more often and need to operate our air conditioning system more often in order to cool the house and circulate the air, an additional expense to our family.

In addition, it has been well documented that some individuals experience severe physical, emotional, and psychological symptoms from living in close proximity to wind turbines. From our review of some of the information that is available, these are not isolated or highly rare cases. We believe it is unjust to have these wind turbines constructed in such close proximity to our home (as well as our neighbors homes), while the study of the ill effects of wind turbines on some individuals is still not completely understood. It would be more reasonable and just to defer the construction of new wind turbines near homes until their impacts are fully and clearly understood.

- Continued North Kent Wind 1 Project - Public Meeting # 2 - November 5, 2015

Thank you very much for the opportunity to understand your latest research and plans at the meeting last Thursday, and provide feedback to you.

Current status - Non-Participant experience, among South Kent Wind Turbines

We farm the land initially purchased by my husband's parents in 1964. This quiet location had been a blessed haven when enduring migraines, until spring of 2013, when South Kent Wind construction traffic started.

We are now surrounded by turbines of South Kent Wind, with the closest being 813 m from our residence, and another 5 turbines a distance of 1.3 km or less. Walking a circle around our house this week, in predominantly leaf-off conditions, a total of 75 turbines are visible (more may be hidden being woodlots on the horizon, etc.)

We did not sign with South Kent Wind, since there was not enough evidence to guarantee that migraine sufferers would not be negatively impacted by turbines.

Frequency of headaches have increased for me, and the outdoors walk to our woodlot, which sometimes alleviated the pain, now only brings me closer to the nearest turbine, and walking in any other direction also brings me closer to turbines. When I am experiencing a migraine, the turbine noise is often unbearable, as is the shadow flicker if I were to walk in late afternoon/early morning. Additionally here, once the major issues have been dealt with (ie health), we will need to address the significant degradation of our television reception.

Current status - in North Kent Wind 1 Project area, specifically

The farm purchased by my grandparents in 1951, and subsequently by my parents (and where I was raised), is a tranquil haven. It is far enough from the next paved road to allow for peaceful enjoyment of many sounds of nature, and to rest for anyone plagued by health issues. There is a substantial creek running through the property, and the beginnings of a woodlot, started by my father in 1981. The land has been well cared by family over the decades, well loved by the children who lived there, and those who visited to enjoy the country atmosphere. The intent among the current owners and we their children, has always been that this would continue and be augmented for decades to come.

North Kent Wind 1 Long-term Implications.

We thought we might move to my parents' farm, if South Kent Wind ended up making me sick. Should your current project put Turbine 9 only 571 m from my sister's home, the sweep from Turbines 9 and 12 will eliminate any area on my parents' farm where we could put a home further than the 813 m here. Although your "experts" tell us that low frequency noise and infrasound needn't be a concern with the wind farms, and so isn't even worthy of being measured (if I understood those discussions correctly), recent research to the contrary is ringing true for what I am feeling here, surrounded by South Kent Wind turbines.

Besides the concern of turbine proximity to my sister's residence, and any we would hope to build, your maps show Turbine 9 less than 250 m from the woodlot my father has started, and we will continue to expand. This is where we camp (with a trailer), again currently a tranquil place that proposed turbines will make noisy and unbearable for me. Recently I've awoke with a headache every morning here (in South Kent Wind), but for the 2 recent nights we slept at the trailer at my father's woodlot, I had no headaches.

Our children enjoyed playing in this woodlot, and along the creek, enjoying the sights and sounds of nature, with no concern on our part for their health. We hope our grand-children will enjoy this same

benefit, with no health concern, on family-owned property, where property taxes have been paid for decades in the past, and planned for decades in the future. The sounds of nature in our own woodlot in South Kent are now frequently drowned out by the noise of the adjacent turbines, and cannot be enjoyed by us, our children nor grandchildren. Our quality of life related to that woodlot, has suffered greatly.

Additionally, we have suffered the loss of 28 mature evergreen trees on a neighbouring farm. I planted those seedlings with my sister-in-law and late father-in-law in 1980, and proudly tracked their growth over the decades. Although the current landowner, a participant, was promised these would not be cut down, they were just days before the big crane came. November 28, 2013 was a horrid day of betrayal for me, as I watched 28 vibrant, green trees destroyed by the "Green" Energy Act. I pass that barren fenceline now, every day I drive to work. Another blow to quality of life here. Another concern regarding the proximity of Turbine 9 is that of falling ice. We see notices in our local paper advising people they should stay away. This would require my sister avoiding her usual route for walking her dogs, and my family avoiding winter activities at the creek.

Again, I only **focus** here **on the health and safety issues** to be addressed, knowing there will likely be additional issues to deal with, such as compromised television reception. We would hope there is still some quality of life to be preserved at my parents' farm.

North Kent Wind 1 Short-term Implications

I hope that with fewer turbines coming to my parents' concession, they will be subjected to:

- Less trespassing on non-participating property, by Project contractors on ATV's, "taking a shortcut" to participating land. (Which is what happened to our neighbour here in South Kent)
- Less trespassing on non-participating property, by Project sub-contractors, who feel entitled to HDD into non-participating wheat fields (Which is what happened to our neighbour here in South Kent)
- Less falling turbine parts (experimental or otherwise) landing in non-participating fields we could be working in (Recalling the piece that fell into our neighbour's field, from the blade of the turbine on the adjacent property. It sounds like NextEra has recently had similar issues.)
- Less death of unsuspecting pets on roads which are normally so quiet that a cat or dog can easily hear the one vehicle that is approaching. They are caught off-guard by the astronomical increase in volume and speed of traffic generated by Project Construction. (Local pets were killed here, and likely far more throughout the South Kent Wind Project area).
- Less noise on the roads, by the above-mentioned increase in volume and speed (and vehicle size) of traffic, and by HDD and other operations, etc. from early in the morning to very late at night, and on any day except Christmas and Boxing Day. (When I was trying to recover from headaches here in South Kent, this was a great hindrance.)

Having learned that the North Kent Wind 1 project will build 36 of the 46 turbines mapped, we hope you will consider our concerns, and leave Turbine 9 out of the project. Ideally, we'd also ask to have Turbine 12 off the project, since you already have the noise from the sub-station pointed in that direction. If you are unwilling to remove Turbine 9 from the project, we would respectfully ask that you at least move it much further to the west, in order to reduce the noise that will come to my parents' woodlot and creek, any my sister's home.

Thank you for your consideration of these concerns, and you consideration in reducing the number of proposed turbines near our "family farm."

To the project developers/consultant of the NKW1P,

I am submitting this e-mail as I was encouraged to do so following my attendance at the second meeting on Nov. 5, 2015 of the North Kent Wind 1 Project.

After conducting further research regarding wind turbines, I need to voice my concern about the project.

I am a (non-participating) resident on Caledonia road. Looking at the Draft Construction Plan Report, I see turbine 9 is located 570 m from my home. As I continue to do research on the impact of infrasound and low frequency noise occurring as a result of turbines, I have many concerns relate to health issues. I personally have been diagnosed by my sleep doctor with severe sleep disorder and by my rheumatologist with fibromyalgia. I also have in the past, been on high blood pressure medication and am hoping not to have to take them again.

As a teacher of 25 years, working mainly with students ages 4-7, I have great concern about the occurrence of hearing issues especially in younger children who are still growing and developing.

Additionally, Chatham Kent is already known for being an area where the residents have high incidence of heart attack and stroke. It is disconcerting to see more turbines being built in this area, and at minimal distances to homes, especially of non-participating land owners. It is a known fact that CK has a quickly aging population and some studies show increased health risks for seniors.

It is unfortunate (sad) that so many stewards of the land who so tirelessly dedicated their lives and that of their families to this area, may face additional health issues (besides the usual aging circumstances) simply by continuing to reside on their land they have loved and protected for a lifetime.

Many of us have lived here, chosen or inherited this area specifically for the quiet, rural properties it offers, now some of us may have to make life altering decisions to try and safe guard our health, future and that of generations yet to come. Up to this point, succession planning discussions with my parents, included my eventual ownership of land and ongoing residence here, which was desired by all of us, and most beneficial to my health.

Of other note of importance (although I realize perhaps not for the purposes of this study, but most certainly for our entire family and friends who often use this area), is our family woodlot established in 1981 by my father, now in his 80's. Said woodlot is approximately 210m from the proposed turbine 9. This woodlot is a

developing area and as we know, takes many years to become established and continue to grow and change. It is home to a wide variety of trees including Osage orange, black and English walnut, oak, corkscrew and weeping willow, silver maple, ironwood, shade master locust, bass, catalpa and a variety of pine and cedar. Numerous animal species reside here including rabbit, squirrel, chipmunk, deer, many other birds, and snakes, including fox snakes. A watercourse is also within 205m of turbine 9. Species having habitats here include turtles, fish, carp, pike, snails, ducks, catfish, blue herons and king fishers. We enjoy our recreational time in this woodlot and surrounding area. The family camping trailer is located beside our woodlot where family and friends spend much quality time observing and studying the environment.

Another note is my concern for the livestock housed on the farm and possibility of health issues such as behaviour changes, nervousness, and reproductive health issues.

My understanding from my attendance at the second meeting of the NKW1P, on Nov 5, 2015, is that there are 46 possible turbine sites, however only 36 turbines will actually be placed. I am asking for a thorough review of the number of turbines built within this project. Specifically I am requesting turbine 9 be one of the 10 turbines omitted from this construction project. At the very least, if turbine 9 is constructed, it be placed far more westerly than the current draft placement indicates. This would at least place it further from my residence.

I would sincerely appreciate it if careful and caring consideration is given before the construction of turbine 9 and again ask it be considered as not one of the 36 to be built.

Thank you for bringing to our attention potential updates required to our mapping included in the Draft Renewable Energy Approval (REA) Reports in regards to water wells on your property. The maps included in the Draft REA Reports display publically available data from 2015 provided by the Ontario Ministry of the Environment and Climate Change. Your well was not recorded within the Ministry's dataset. Prior to construction, North Kent Wind 1 will be conducting a survey of private water wells within a 500 m radius of potential water taking locations. Any wells within the 500 m radius will also be monitored prior to and during construction to determine whether there are any effects of construction dewatering on the wells.

As mentioned in the Draft Construction Plan Report, our initial assessments conclude that there is a low likelihood that groundwater quantity and quality would be impacted by the Project. To respond to your concern in your letter, please note that the provision of temporary potable water supply to property owners is not a mitigation measure that we anticipate will be required as a result of construction activities; rather, it is a contingency measure that North Kent Wind 1 will follow in the unlikely event that groundwater impacts are temporarily experienced by property owners adjacent to construction.

Our water well is used for both domestic and livestock purposes. It is a good water well with regards to both quantity and quality of water it delivers and has been in continuous use for decades serving our two family farms. The well is located between our properties. I have reviewed the AECOM prepared maps Figure 2-3a and Figure 2-3b; Project Location and Socio-Economic Features found in the hardcopies of the draft REA reports available to the public after September 4, 2015 at the Chatham-Kent Civic Centre and Chatham-Kent Public Library. Both these maps are grossly inaccurate. A number of my neighbour's water wells are not correctly shown on these maps. A number of gas wells are not shown and a major gas pipeline is not shown crossing GreenValley Line! I have read the AECOM memorandum dated July 9th, 2015 on Hydrogeological Conditions and Well Feasibility. I do not believe you have done enough proper work or due diligence on your part in locating our water wells prior to wind turbine construction. In Mark van der Woerd's own words only a "desktop study conducted to provide a highlevel characterization of hydrogeologic conditions" was done. This is inadequate to address my family's concerns over the risks North Kent 1 poses to our continued water well use. Obviously the desktop study is a poor attempt and is unreliable as both maps are grossly inaccurate. You acknowledge the risks you pose to our water wells from the construction of nearby wind turbines in a AECOM prepared Table 3: Mitigation Measures, Net Effects and Monitoring Plan; Geology and Groundwater. Your mitigation measure of offering a temporary potable water supply to the property owner is completely unacceptable. We have enjoyed decades of potable water from our well. Why haven't you conducted a proper detailed survey of all the property owners with water wells in the proposed North Kent 1 Wind Farm prior to construction? It's clear to me that beginning construction without proper accurate maps is asking for a lawsuit should you damage our water well. How is it possible that you think you can propose such inaccurate maps to the Renewable Energy Approvals Unit? Take this feedback and ensure your company acts responsibly and as a good neighbour as required under REG359/09 regulations. I look forward to your reply.

Regarding your comments about the placement of turbines, please know that the proposed Project layout has been designed to meet the regulatory requirements for renewable energy projects outlined by the Ontario Ministry of the Environment and Climate Change. The minimum setback requirement from non-participating receptors (e.g., residential homes, schools, and other uses sensitive to noise) is 550 m. Sound levels from turbines must also be at or below 40 decibels (dBA) at 6 metres per second (m/sec) at all non-participating receptors. This standard is set by the provincial government under the *Environmental Protection Act* in Ontario Regulation (O. Reg.) 359/09, as amended.

Determining where a wind turbine can be located is a complex process. There are many environmental considerations that influence the location of a potential wind turbine, including archeology, cultural heritage, aquatic and terrestrial ecology, groundwater, sound and setbacks from existing infrastructure (e.g., roads and railways). During the turbine siting process, environmental constraints are identified and reviewed based on input from technical experts and government agencies, including the Lower Thames Valley Conservation Area and Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry. The ultimate location of wind turbines needs to meet the standard as set by the provincial government under the *Environmental Protection Act* in O. Reg. 359/09, as amended.

While it is possible to site closer to the Hydro lines, as a matter of practice we only do so if it is not possible/feasible to shift away from them.

As I mention, the Hydro line is the primary constraint; however, there are actually many more constraints that are considered, including the sound profile of the turbine in relation to the other turbines around it. In this case, moving the turbine further west may create sound levels that are not consistent with regulations at other receptors. A bit difficult to explain over email, but I'm happy to discuss further at the open house this Thursday, if you can make it.

I responded and mailed in feedback to Pattern Development, Samsung Renewable Energy and AECOM Canada Ltd on October 1st, 2015 as requested from the Notice of Draft REA Reports and Second Public Meeting that was mailed to me. I have not received any replies to my feedback letter from Jody Law-Project Developer at Pattern Development, Ariel Bautista-Project Developer at Samsung Renewable Energy and Mark van der Woerd-Senior Environmental Planner at AECOM Canada Ltd. These three individuals have their mailing and contact information on the Notice from North Kent Wind Farm Project.

Could I have a reply?

I would draw your ATTENTION to the fact that the AECOM prepared maps Figure 2-3a and Figure 2-3b: Project Location and Socio-economic features as found in the Draft REA reports available to the public are inaccurate. A major gas pipe-line is absent from these maps as well as a number of gas wells. A great number of rural residents water wells are not shown in these maps. It is my understanding from reading the hydrogeological assessment as prepared by AECOM that only a record review of the MOECC database was done to identify water wells in the PSA. This is not proper due diligence on the part of AECOM. Many wells are not on this database. In speaking with a professional licensed well driller in our area it is common knowledge in the trade that this database cannot be relied upon solely for water well locations. I urge you to consider doing an additional investigation and mail out a survey letter to all rural residents inside the PSA to properly document well location and status and then recalculate risk to nearby private well owners from an accurate information source.

We are writing to respond to your email below.

The proposed Project Layout has been designed to meet the regulatory requirements for renewable energy projects outlined by the Ontario Ministry of the Environment and Climate Change. The minimum setback requirement from non-participating receptors (e.g., residential homes, schools, and other uses sensitive to noise) is 550 m. Sound levels from turbines must also be at or below 40 decibels ("dBA") at 6 metres per second ("m/sec") at all non-participating receptors. This standard is set by the provincial government under the Environmental Protection Act in Ontario Regulation (O. Reg.) 359/09, as amended. In addition, Health Canada published a study on November 6, 2014 (http://www.hcsc.gc.ca/ewh-semt/noise-bruit/turbine-eoliennes/summary-resume-eng.php) that determined noise from wind turbines did not have any measurable effect on illness and chronic disease, stress, quality of sleep or overall quality of life. The findings from the Health Canada study and field research are consistent with a recent report commissioned through the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) which provides one of the most comprehensive and multidisciplinary reviews of the scientific literature on wind turbines and human health to date. The MIT paper, entitled "Wind Turbines and Health: A Critical Review of the Scientific Literature" concludes that the levels of infrasound at customary setback distances are typically below audibility, there is no clear or consistent association between noise and health, infrasound and low frequency sound do not present health risks, and noise plays a minor role in comparison with other factors in leading people to report annoyance.

Regarding your comments on the potential health effects associated with wind projects, many studies have been conducted world-wide to examine the relationship between wind turbines and possible human health effects. Overall, health and medical agencies agree that when sited properly, wind turbines are not causally related to adverse health effects.

While visual effects are ultimately dependent on the perception of residents and visitors to the presence of turbines, the Project is committed to an overall net benefit to the community through community involvement, providing increases the municipal property tax base and increasing Ontario's renewable energy supplies. In regards to your concerns over the potential for the North Kent Wind 1 Project to impact your property value, peer-reviewed research has demonstrated that proximity to a wind farm does not have a negative impact on property values. We received a letter today of a meeting taking place in November. The letter had a map of where the proposed turbines will be going.

As we have found there will be 2 placed very closely behind our house and a substation in front of our house. You can imagine how upsetting this is to find that every view from our home that we have lived in for 23 years will be ruined with your equipment.

Having said that, I agree with clean energy. I agree with turbines and the environmental positives that come out of it. But residential areas are a ridiculous and detrimental place to put them. I'm certain that the person reading this email would not want one in their back yard. Aside from the enjoyment of our home and the constant noise, I understand there are potential health issues associate and we appear to be smack in the middle.

My husband and I have done years and years of renovation and work here to make our home comfortable and enjoyable. But as we are getting older and our children are almost gone, we had considered moving in the next two or three years.

Your wind turbine will absolutely reduce the value of our home. Aside from this, I can't imagine that we will be able to sell with two wind turbines behind our home. No one will chose to live here. We will be trapped in a home that probably would have sold quickly otherwise. These wind farms have horrendous reputations and so we are stuck.

What is our alternative? Will you be offering buy-outs to people in our position as it will be your fault? Do we need to sue you?

We will be going to your next meeting to hear your comments on this but I would appreciate you addressing my concerns very soon. We will have our home valued and then I believe you should have to cover the reduction in the value for putting your equipment over our home.

You will be reducing the enjoyment of our home with new equipment in our area. We will definitely be consulting a lawyer if your answers to our problems are not adequate.

Lastly, I see that the turbines on the farmer's property is much much closer to my home than it is to his home. I understand they are wealthy farmers and a doctor, but to put that beside my house rather than theirs is just a slap in the face.

Thank you for bringing to our attention potential updates required to our mapping included in the Draft Renewable Energy Approval (REA) Reports in regards to water wells on your property. The maps included in the Draft REA Reports display publically available data from 2015 provided by the Ontario Ministry of the Environment and Climate Change. Your well was not recorded within the Ministry's dataset.

As mentioned in the Draft Construction Plan Report, our initial assessments conclude that there is a low likelihood that groundwater quantity and quality will be impacted by the Project. Prior to construction, North Kent Wind 1 will be conducting a survey of private water wells within a 500 m radius of potential water taking locations. Any wells within the 500 m radius will also be monitored prior to and during construction to determine whether there are any effects of construction dewatering on the wells. In the unlikely event that a temporary impact occurs during construction, temporary potable water supply will be provided to property owners.
